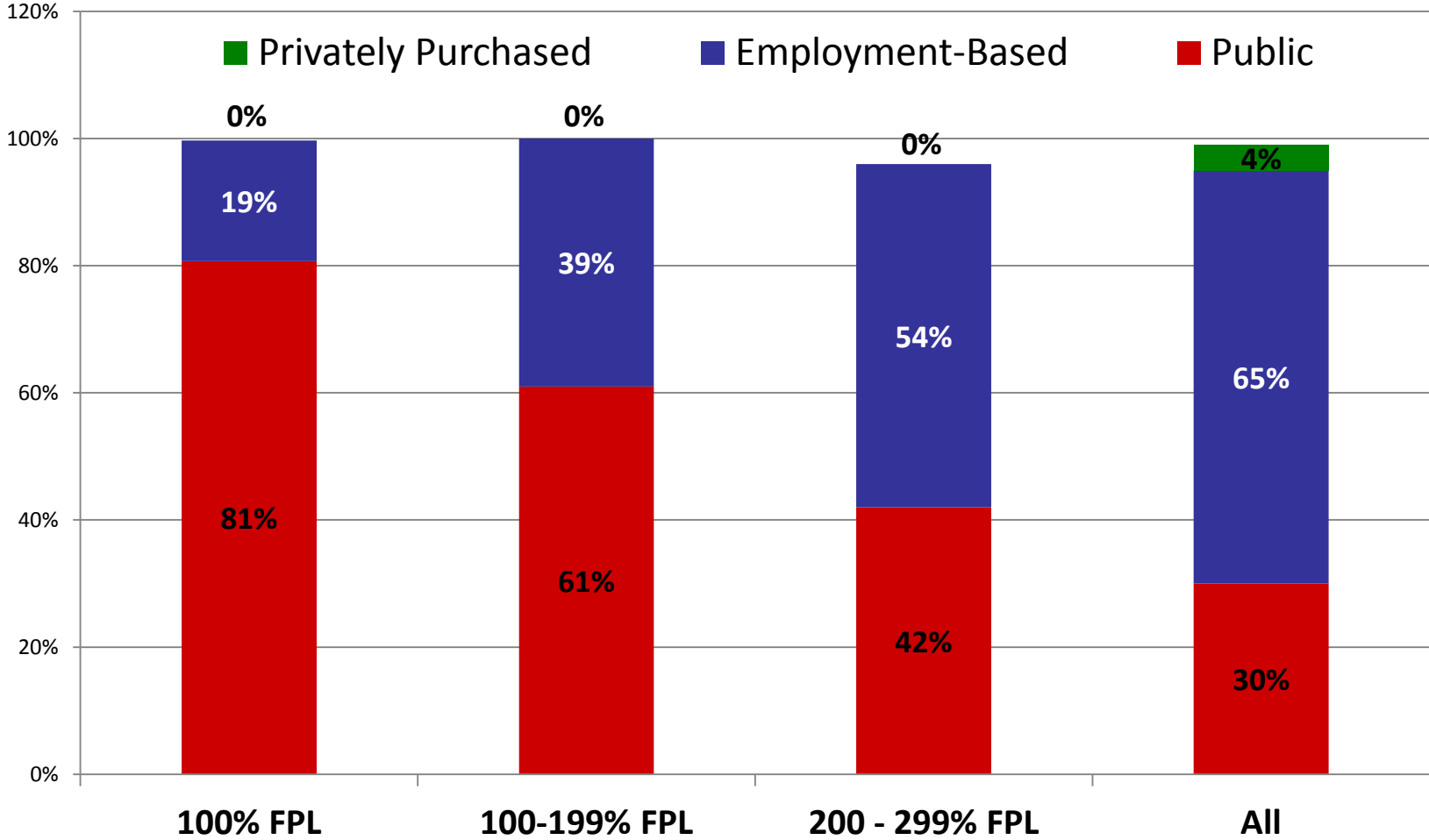

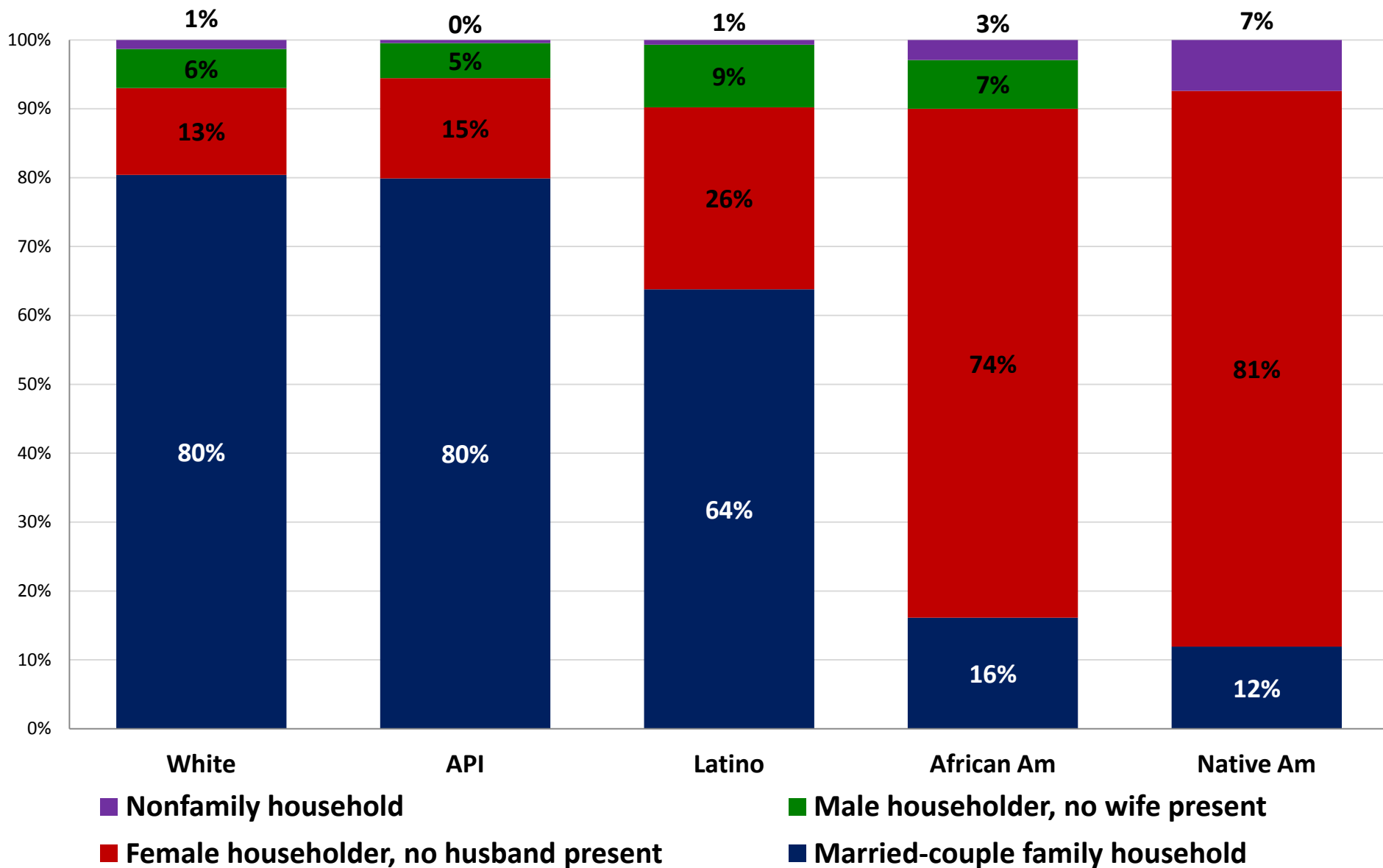

Household income Gini Coefficients 1990, 2010

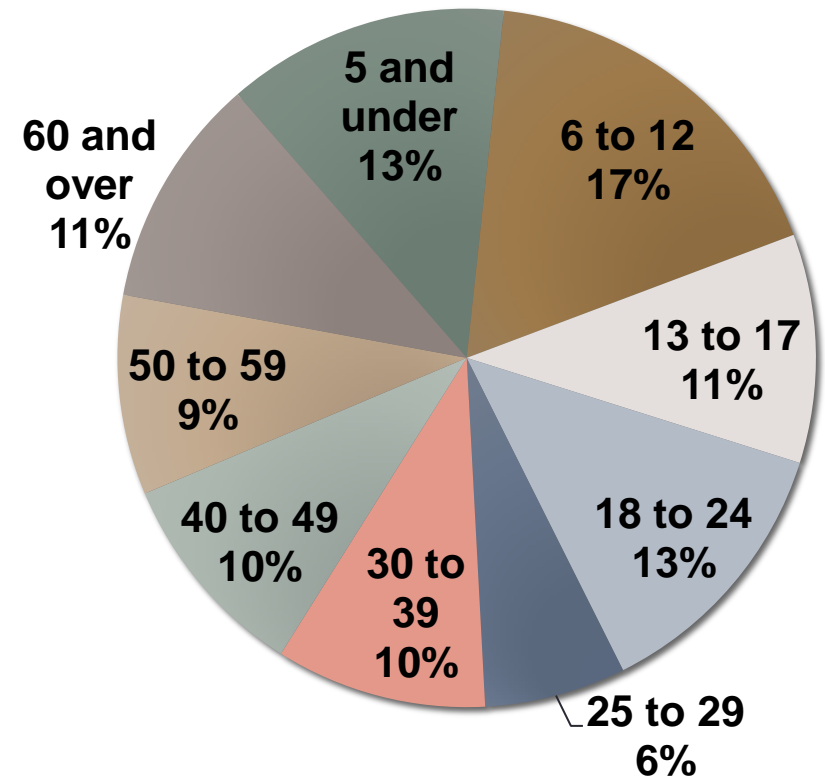

Many Children in Family Public Housing, but also an Aging Population

- 41% of residents in family public housing are children (3,049 out of 7,373)
 - 19% of the City's African American children live in public housing
- But 45% of households in family housing have no children on the lease
 - Households without children are older and more likely to have an adult on SSI
- 70% of adults (18+) are female
- 30% of residents report having a disability to SFHA, including 60% of adults aged 25-64

Ages of Residents



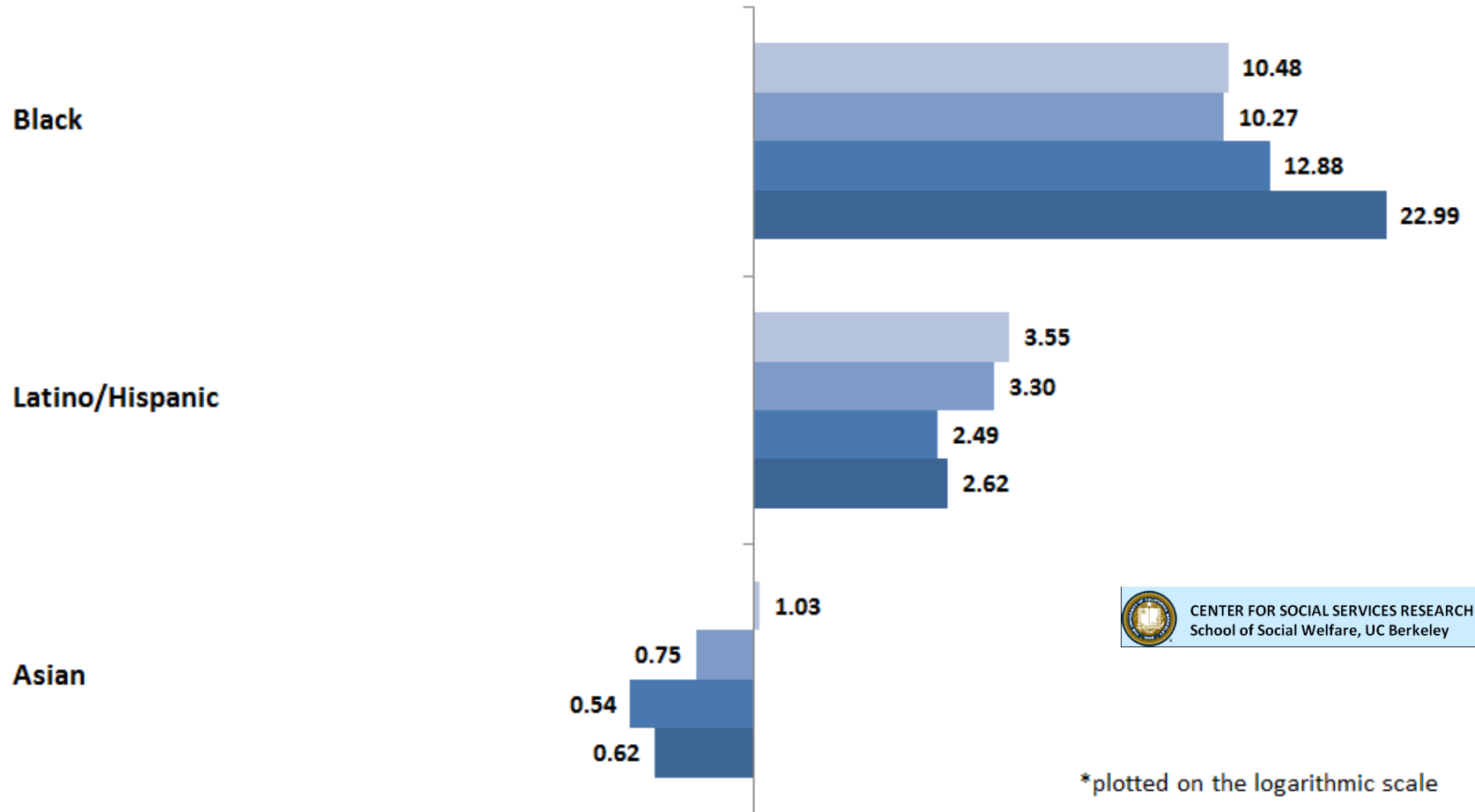

■ allegations ■ substantiations ■ entries ■ in care

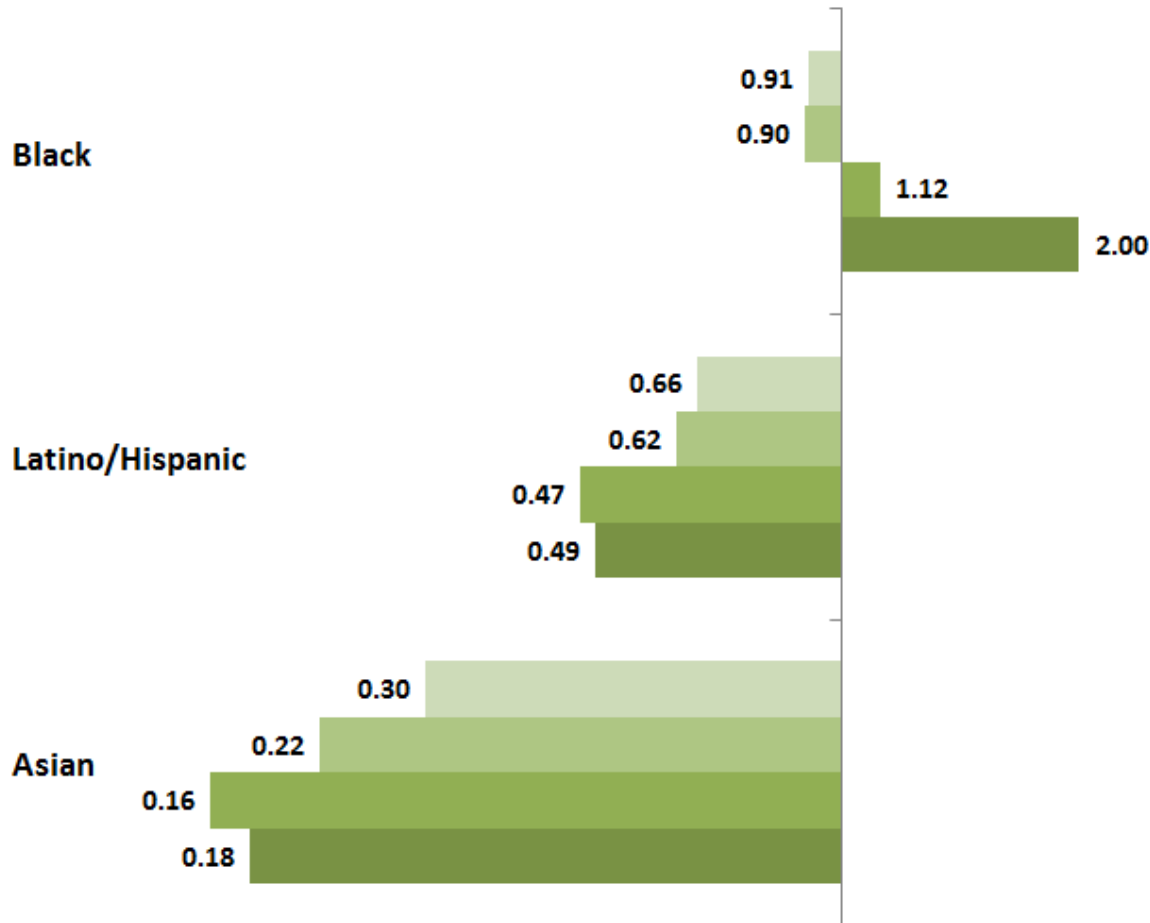

■ allegations ■ substantiations ■ entries ■ in care



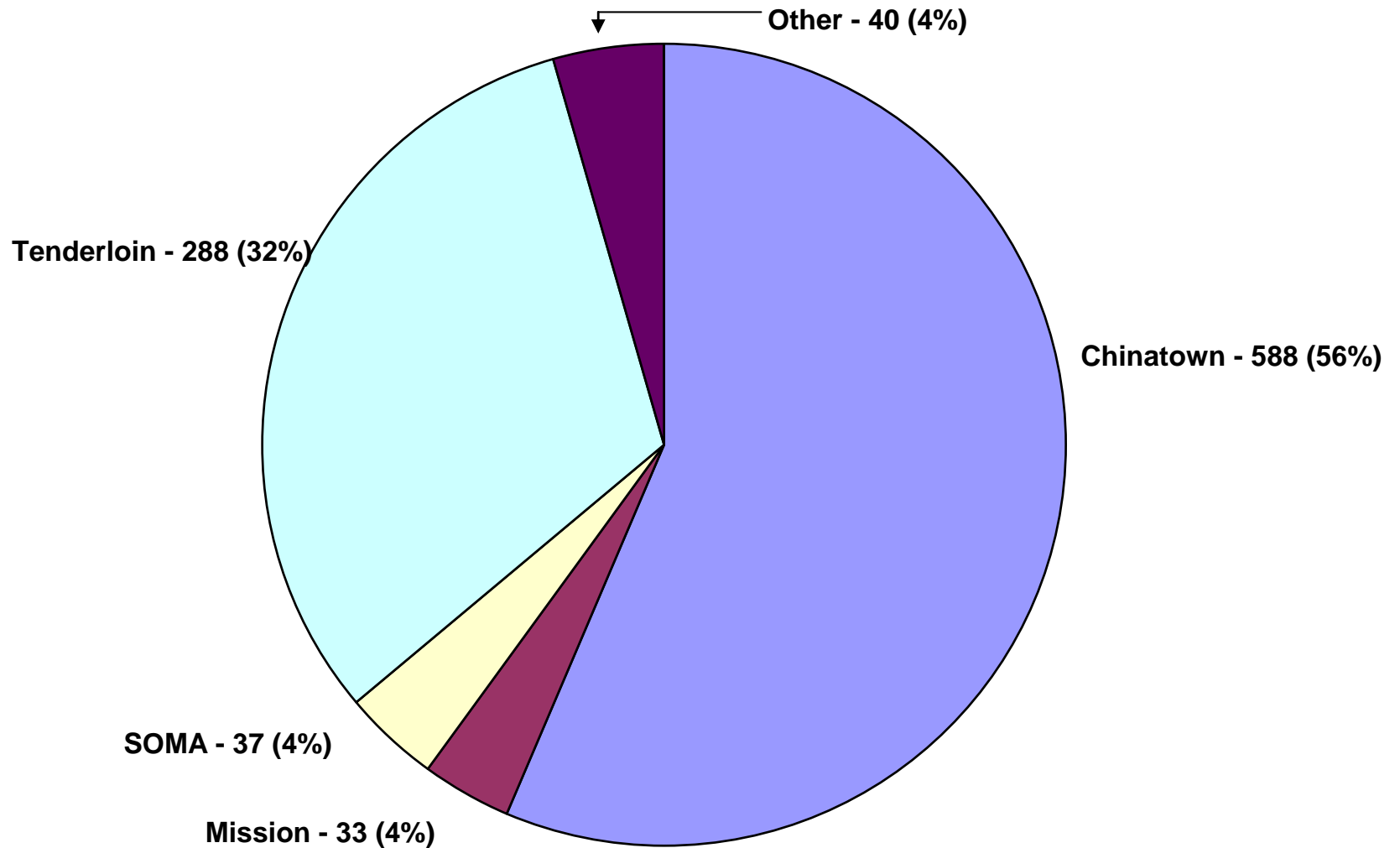

Homeless Families – Connecting Point Waiting List

- ❖ 69% on CalWORKs, 8% receiving unemployment benefits, and 20% receiving employment income
- ❖ Loss of work (10%) was the second most commonly reported cause for becoming homeless, which also included being asked to move out (22%), fleeing domestic violence (9%), and eviction (9%), as well as a series of other factors.
- ❖ Barriers to housing included behavioral health (19%), history of evictions (10%), domestic violence (9%), physical health problems (5%), and criminal records (4%).
